TEACHING INTERESTS

I have enjoyed a diverse and stimulating teaching career during my time at Hunter College. The variety of the Department's offerings has enabled me to savor a variety of different subject matter and student groups.

I have taught in all aspects of Urban Affairs offerings including the two graduate programs and the undergraduate program, combining thereby an interest in basic freshman and sophomore education while also teaching specialized graduate courses related to planning, employment, education and urbanism.

I regularly teach the basic core course in the graduate Urban Affairs graduate program as well as the core course in planning and urbanism in the graduate program in Urban Planning.

I have devoted a great deal of effort to developing a basic undergraduate prescription course, usually involving over hundred students, which emphasizes the presentation of fundamental social science concepts regarding urbanism, urban life, planning social and public policy. The course involves materials drawn from novels, anthropological sources, governmental documents, and basic data drawn from the U.S. Census and New York City governmental agencies. This course has attracted a great deal of interest and attention and is currently being offered as a freshman sophomore introductory "bridge course" for students in the social sciences.

I have recently developed a new social science interdisciplinary course on work and employment in relationship to social policy and individual choice. This course was a direct result of my participation in an interdisciplinary Social Sciences Mellon Seminar made available through the Division of Social Sciences at Hunter College. It was first offered in the spring of 1986 and was offered again in the fall of 1988, through the auspices of the Honors Program.

I also taught in the spring semester of 1987, jointly with Professor Alan Holder of the English Department an Honors course offered by the Humanities Division, "The American Wilderness, Images, Experiences and Public Policies." This dealt with the quest for transcendence as reflected in relationships to nature, wilderness, and the natural environment and the need on an ecology oriented land use ethic to influence public policy and land use planning. This is the first time such a course was ever offered within the City University system.

PERSONAL STATEMENT

I have been Chair of the Department of Urban Affairs and Planning for the past eight years and am now serving the first year of a three year term. I have been at Hunter since 1971, during which time I have also served on the staff of the U.S. House of Representatives and Senate, participating in a number of committee assignments to the Committee on Education and Labor. I have also worked in the executive branch of the national government, as well as on the staff of the Speaker of the New York State Assembly. In those positions, I was involved in the development of legislation regarding full employment at the national and state levels, as well as issues related to equality of educational opportunity at the state level. These activities were related to the writing of two books as well as numerous articles and research reports. I now teach the basic core course-Structure of the Urban Region- in the planning and affairs programs and have also in the past taught a great variety of other courses. My current research interests, related to presentation of a paper at the 2006 Urban Affairs conference, are concerned with the history of the concept and goal of full employment and how it has evolved since the end of World War II. Related to this is my most recent focus on issues of policy and planning as expressed in the original 1944 proposal of President Roosevelt for an Economic and Social Bill of Rights, and the manner in which these goals have evolved over the last half century and remain at the center of current political debate.
